From the Pastor's Desk

HARMONY LINES

Years ago, the St. Olaf Choir visited the town I was working in at the time. In the middle of the concert, the conductor turned to the audience and highlighted the variety of individuals that made up the choir. He noted how incredible it was to have this group of people with different interests, majors, faiths, heritages, and nationalities all pulling in the same direction to create something remarkable—their music



He then turned back to the choir and began their next selection. It was an amazing piece—and it wouldn't have been the same without each of those people working together.

There is something to hearing a musical arrangement that can make us wonder how something like this exists.

If we let ourselves wonder, there is a lot we can learn. First, there has to be the cooperation of a community. To create anything, the group must agree on what's being created and how to get there. Everyone needs to know which key the piece is in and who is singing or playing what.

We will quickly notice that not everyone is singing the same note—and it's supposed to be that way.

There is a purpose for each of the lines that enriches and completes the sound and direction of the music. Ideally, all of the parts would hear the bigger picture even as they hold their part of it.

The bass note serves as an anchor for everything that goes on around it. No matter what else is happening, these notes hold the foundation of the piece and allow something to be built.

Then there are the middle tones. These parts often fill in what's needed, but they're also the parts of the music that truly define what it is. Based on the movement of these middle parts, a chord can change from major to minor, can hold tension or dissonance, and find solutions to it. Sometimes the role of these tones is to add depth to an otherwise thin sound. Sometimes it is to hold that tension—to push against another note in order to make the resolution more powerful.

The melody line generally has the spotlight—and it needs to be solid and carry the theme—but it would sound hollow without the rest of the ensemble to fill out the sound. This support makes the music purposeful, powerful, and meaningful. If the melody doesn't hear or acknowledge what those other parts are doing, the overall song loses some of its impact. Similarly, if the other parts don't know what's happening in the melody, it can result in a very disjointed piece.



In our lives, there will be different parts to play depending on the situation. Sometimes it will be your role to carry the melody line, to keep the theme visible while understanding the roles that support it. Sometimes it will be your role to hold tension or add depth to what is already happening. Sometimes you will need to just fill in with what's needed. Sometimes you will be the one to maintain the foundation so that something new and different can be tried. Sometimes you will need to try that new and different thing.

When it all comes together, though, and all the parts understand the bigger picture and the role they play in it, something truly amazing has a chance of being created.

Ladies of LCOR

I'd like to invite you again this year, if you are so inclined, to join sisters in the faith at Emmanuel Lutheran in Norwood, (where I work) to put together quilts for Lutheran World Relief (LWR).

This will be the 15th year that ladies get together on **Saturday mornings**, from **9 to noon** (or some portion of that time period) to assemble quilts. Assembling quilts involves placing fabric on a table, followed by a layer of batting, and then a quilt top. The 3 layers are then pinned and tied with crochet cord and the edges are pinned to form a hem so that the quilt can be finished by one of their "hemmers." There are usually about 4 folks working together assembling a quilt, so there's always at least 1 person to coach any newbie along. Several LCOR members have attended over the last two year's seasons and enjoyed it a lot!

The "piece makers" will be meeting Saturdays in **February** and continue through **March** 23rd. No sewing is involved for assemblers, there is no obligation to go for the whole morning – or attend more than once. Over the years their numbers have dwindled a bit, due to people moving away, the pandemic, and the fact that sadly, some of their older members have passed away. They are looking for more people to join in the fun, knowing that many people around the globe will find comfort and warmth in one of these quilts. And, the quilts are distributed via LWR without any expectation from the recipients. A person does not need to be a member of their church or, indeed, of any church in order to join the quilting group. (Also, you can go once – or as many Saturdays as you like—and if you can't make the whole 3 hours - that's ok too, come a little later or leave a little early – as your schedule allows.)





Service Need/Opportunities

St. Pauly's Textile Shed

The problem: An EPA study says that 85% of clothing in the U.S. is ultimately thrown away instead of donated. Also, did you know that textiles of any kind (clothing, linens, etc.) can no longer be discarded in a landfill.

A potential solution: LCOR was recently approached by a group called St. Pauly Textile, Inc. This is an organization that partners with organizations (like LCOR!) to collect clothing and other textiles in a uniquely clean and community friendly way. They set up a beautifully constructed, wood frame, clothing drop-off shed in a community. The organization hosting the shed receives funding for all of the clothing donated to the shed. (These are not the metal bins that you've seen overflowing in various places)

The congregation council has discussed this and is inclined to proceed. Frankly, it's a win-win! St Pauly provides the shed, maintains it (even if it's hit by a snow plow!), distributes the donations (wearable textiles to appropriate places, non-wearable textiles to recycling facilities). LCOR receives money based on the textile donations received. Congregation council members have talked with churches that already participate with St. Pauly Textile, Inc and the response has been fully positive.

LCOR's responsibility is pretty minimal... Allow placement of the shed on our property (we've already been in contact with our insurers about this and they're also positive), and have someone(s) from our congregation be willing to check the shed 2-3 times/week. Specifically, to move things from inside the shed away from the "chute" to be sure that things can freely flow into the shed and that there will never be a backup to the outside.

The council views this as a good opportunity for not only revenue but for an environmentally friendly activity and service for those without adequate clothing. We've done our due diligence on the organization and they seem quite reliable.

What can you do?

We are in need of 3 "shed monitors". A shed monitor would commit to checking on the shed once a week on their own schedule.... To move things away from the inside of the chute. If there is a backup outside, call St. Pauley Textiles and they'll come to empty the shed. Being a shed monitor involves very little time per week (10-15") but is crucial to the success of this endeavor.

Service Need/Opportunities (continued)

What a shed monitor does not do:

- *Maintain the shed in terms of painting, etc.
- *Empty the shed or sort/transport the donations
- *Advertise the project.

Who can help? All of us!! Any one of any age can be a shed monitor. This is an excellent opportunity for someone to volunteer to help out on their own schedule... You decide when you'll check on the shed (along with your fellow shed monitors). No meetings.... No other responsibilities.

A teen looking to help out and fulfill community service hours for church or school... An adult looking for an opportunity to contribute to community and church on their own time that doesn't interfere with work or family time.... And again, all of us.... to donate our textiles.

Altar Flowers
