

What is Quiet Christmas?

In 2022, Pastor Sarah introduced the Worship & Music Committee to this service, which is sometimes referred to as a Blue Christmas or Longest Night service. As our congregation had not experienced this service in the past, we weren't sure what to expect.

But as we explored this further, we discussed that, though Christmas is of course a season of celebration, this is not always a happy season for everyone. Grief, loss, illness, loneliness, and many other things can affect how we feel at this time of year.

A Quiet Christmas Service is a Christmas Service that keeps a more somber tone to offer a sacred space and theological context for those for whom the holidays are not as joyful. At this time, we remember that Jesus comes into the world as it is and meets each of us as we are with whatever we're carrying. We recall the gift of God's love for us and presence with us no matter what.

The Quiet Christmas Service at LCOR will be held on

Sunday, December 22, at 4:00 p.m. The service will include Holy Communion as well as Prayers for Healing. All are welcome and invited to attend. There will be Christmas music/carols that are more somber in nature.

Below are some comments from people who have attended in the past:

**I wasn't really sure what to expect at the Longest Night service. I went more out of obligation than seeking a respite, but the impact of the service is still with me today. Pastor Sarah reminded us that Christ came to this world to meet us where we are - to be with us in whatever we are going through. In that quiet service, with the candle lighting, the prayers of healing, and the music, I felt peace. True peace. I understood in my heart that God truly does love me and meets me right where I am - no matter what. The peace has stayed with me. In whatever I am going through, I can think of this service and remember that Christ is with me. I am not alone. My hope is that others will experience this special service and feel this peace in their lives. Christ is with us; we are not alone.

**I lost my dad unexpectedly 17 years ago; though holidays and milestone celebrations have been joyous since he passed away and life has gone on, there was always a sense of sadness and emptiness around these times for me. I was intrigued by the idea of Blue Christmas and wasn't sure what to expect but decided to go as LCOR has been a safe haven for me.

From the Pastor's Desk



Watching and Waiting with Jesus Portions adapted from the sermon for 11/10/2024

Advent is the season of watching and waiting. During these weeks, we watch and wait for what is to come. We anticipate Jesus' arrival both at Christmas and in the fullness of time.

A couple of weeks ago, however, the Lectionary Readings included Mark12:38-44. There's a moment in there of Jesus watching and waiting, and it got me thinking about this in a different way. The watching and waiting for Jesus might also include watching and waiting with Jesus, taking time to notice what Jesus would notice and pointing it out so that we can act together for a better world.



What does Jesus notice in this passage? What does he point out?

Jesus sits down across from the treasury, where people are placing their donations or offerings. You can almost see that bustling line, hear the noise of little conversations, and maybe even catch people noticing who is in attendance.

Jesus has been talking about a broken system. He mentions the scribes in their long robes, who take their profits from the poorest of the poor—they "devour widows' houses" (Mark 12:40)—to keep their extravagance going. It is a broken system. It's a system that could be better—that should be better.

But things seem...fine. People are going about their days, and the sun comes up and goes down as it should and it all is what it is. They might ask if it is really that bad, or even happening at all.

Jesus sits down across from the treasury. He watches and waits like he knows what he's going to see. Before he even needs to stand up to stretch his legs, she arrives. It's the widow with two copper coins. Jesus notices and points it out. That system he was talking about literally just took the last penny she had.

I have heard this passage talked about another way, where this person is described only as virtuous and generous. All she had, she gave. This moment serves as an example for us, and that's it.

That can't be all there is to it, though. Do we remember what Jesus just said?

In this moment, as we watch and wait with Jesus, we may realize how there's still so much work to be done. Because ideas aren't just ideas, and systems aren't just systems. They're people. They're her.

And we can follow Jesus' example and sit down, focus, and pay attention. Notice what's not working, who's hurting, and then address it. We can find ways to make things better.

Everything Jesus says about the widow is correct. She gave all she had. She gave more than the people with the most. That is absolutely true—but so is what he said about the system. It's taken everything she had, and those with the most still have the most.

How do we fix that? How do we begin?

Here's the amazing good news: we don't have to start this work. The work of making the world better is ongoing. It's already started. We only have to continue—and we can remember that we're not alone in the work that still needs to be done.

Lawn Maintenance - Letter from Paul Burns



I hope you all have enjoyed the looks of our church property over the years. I have been the lawn coordinator for some years now, but I am stepping down from that duty as of the end of the current season. Over my several years of doing this I have seen seasons with plenty of volunteers and several with almost no volunteers. This past season was great. We have had some volunteers with me for years and some recently new. The season consists of 26 weeks or a few more. What happens if we do not fill the weekly schedule the lawn coordinator has had to step in more than the weeks they signed up for. I have had seasons that I only had to perform my assigned weeks, and I have also had to fill in for 18 weeks or more. That is why volunteering is so important. What does not get filled the burden goes to someone. I will still be assisting and taking weeks to mow but I no longer can be responsible to do all the weeks that are not signed up for. The key to this is to have a slew of volunteers that take an assignment.

We have seen in the last mid-week notice that offerings have been in decline for a little while now. You see the size of our property. Imagine if we had to farm this out to a contractor for the season. It will cost the church thousands. So, currently it is especially important not to have to contract the work out or some of it. Actually, once you know what you are doing it only takes a couple of hours.

I am asking (man or woman) to step up and help us out each year going forward. Please note that we are asking for your help to be a member of the team. Maybe you could do one week, great. Maybe two or more, great. Maybe one year a week and another three but anything helps. Maybe you have been a member of the team in the past but dropped out. Maybe you would like to come back and give us a week?

It is simple and all training where needed is provided. Not to mention the good you feel doing something for your church.

We are thankful for everyone who has volunteered for new positions on various teams. Please feel free to ask for information or volunteer at any time. Whatever time you have available is wonderful!




Giving



Altar Flowers

If you'd like to put flowers on the altar, simply sign up on the large flower chart on the bulletin board in the hallway leading to the education wing.

If the flowers are being given in honor or memory of someone, please write that on the flower chart. If no reason is stated on the chart then flowers will be given to the "Glory of God."

You must sign up a minimum of 7 days in advance. Flower arrangements are \$35 each. Please place your payment in the offering plate and be sure you designate the payment as "altar flowers."

These flowers belong to you, after the flowers adorn the altar area for both services, please take your flowers home.
